MARINE CORPS HISTORY IN FEBRUARY

- 1 Feb 1941 Activation of 1st Marine Division, the oldest and largest active-duty division in the USMC.
- 1 Feb 1967 Elements of the 3rd Marine Division began Operation Prairie II in Quang Tri province, South Vietnam.
- 2 Feb 1944 4th Marine Division captured Namur and other islands in the Kwajalein Atoll.
- 6 Feb 1968 During the Battle of Hue City, two reduced Marine battalions, the 1st Battalion, 1st Marines with two companies, and 2nd Battalion, 5th Marines with three, recaptured Hue's hospital, jail, and provincial headquarters.



- 13 Feb 1943 The Marine Corps Women's Reserve was officially established.
- 15 Feb 1898 The explosion of the USS Maine killed 28 Marines and 232 sailors, leading to the Spanish-American War.
- 17 Feb 1967 Operation Deckhouse VI began in Quang Tri province, Vietnam.

- 19 Feb 1945 Marines launched Operation Detachment, invading the volcanic island of Iwo Jima. It became the bloodiest battle in Marine Corps history, where "uncommon valor was a common virtue". The battle lasts more than five weeks, at a cost of 6,821 American dead and 19,217 wounded, as well as approximately 18,000 Japanese troops.
- 23 Feb 1945 Four days into the Iwo Jima campaign, Marines reached the summit of Mt. Suribachi and raised the American flag. Joe Rosenthal's photograph of the second, larger flag-raising became an enduring icon of American resolve.

- 24 Feb 1991 I Marine Expeditionary Force began a massive ground assault to liberate Kuwait during Operation Desert Storm, marking the largest Marine Corps operation in history with over 92,000 personnel. A cease-fire was declared on February 28. A total of 24 Marines were killed during the Gulf War.



- 25 Feb 1968 After a month-long fight during the Tet Offensive, Marines and South Vietnamese forces recaptured the city of Hue, involving intense house-to-house urban combat.
- 28 Feb 1925 Congress passed an act authorizing the modern organization and maintenance of the Marine Corps Reserve.

Seven Members were sworn in at the November meeting, including Jim Brant. Here's Jim's story:

Jim was born and grew up in Buffalo, NY. He is proudly an indigenous American, a member of the Mohawk tribe. He was the youngest of 4 brothers, all of whom served in the Marine Corps, though none made it a career. His oldest brother served during the Korean War and his other 2 brothers served in Vietnam, as Jim did. Jim graduated from high school in 1967 just as the Vietnam War draft was really kicking in. He says he would have been embarrassed to be drafted into the US Army after his 3 brothers were in the Marines, so he enlisted in the Corps and was sent to Marine Corps Recruit Depot (MCRD), Parris Island, SC for recruit training. Following his graduation from boot camp and completion of training with the Infantry Training Regiment, he was ordered to training at the Communication-Electronics School Battalion located at MCRD, San Diego, CA. After completing that year-long training, he got his Military Occupational Specialty of 2800 (Radio Communications Repair Technician) and was ordered to join a Light Anti-Aircraft Missile Battalion at the Marine Corps Air Station, Cherry Point, NC. However, he was there only a few months before he received orders to Vietnam.

After Jim arrived at Danang, So. Vietnam, in 1968, he served for the next 13 months with the 5th and 7th Communications Battalions, maintaining and repairing comm systems all over I Corps, the US military operations area just south of the demilitarized zone between North and South Vietnam. At the end of his Vietnam tour, he was ordered to Marine Corps Base, Quantico, VA, where he was assigned to the USMC Communications School providing training on comm matters for Marine officers. His final tour before his enlistment ended was at the Marine Barracks, Norfolk, VA, where he served in the Military Police. When he got out of the Corps in 1971, Jim returned to Buffalo, NY and went to work at a Western Electric plant before moving to a General Motors (GM) plant. Thereafter, he worked for GM at the Buffalo plant and at a plant in Tuscaloosa, AL, before coming in 2000 to the GM Powertrain Plant on Rte. 2 in Fredericksburg, VA. In the plants in Buffalo and Tuscaloosa, he worked on the factory line but in Fredericksburg he also helped establish the plant's chaplain corps. After working for GM for 30 years, he retired in 2002, about 7 years before the Fredericksburg GM plant closed in 2009/2010.

Jim has played sports his whole life and played on a variety of Marine teams during his time in the Corps. He also began coaching kids' teams in the 1970s and over the years he's coached football, basketball, hockey, and baseball. He continued this coaching after his retirement from GM, coaching kids' teams in the Fredericksburg area in a variety of sports until about 2010. Jim is also an avid golfer and plays on the Senior Team at Lake of the Woods, where he and his wife live. Jim also enjoys bowling.

Jim met his wife, Jo-Ann, at a wedding where each of them was in the wedding party, and married her in Buffalo, NY. in 1976. They had 2 children, a son and a daughter, but their son tragically died when he was 1-year-old. Their daughter lives with their 4 grandchildren in Buffalo, NY.

Welcome to the Jack Maas Detachment, Jim!

Paul Nichols was also sworn in at 15 November 2025 detachment meeting:

Paul grew up in Pittsburgh, PA and enlisted in the Corps right out of high school in 1981. After boot camp at MCRD, Parris Island, SC and infantry training at Camp Geiger, NC, he was assigned to the Reserve Company in Pittsburgh and then got additional Military Police training at Ft. Meade, MD so he had both the 0311 (Infantryman) and 5811(Military Police) Military Occupational Specialties. He returned to active duty in Nov. 1982 and was ordered to join the 1st Battalion, 6th Marines at Camp Lejeune, NC where then Lt. Col. Wesley Fox, the recipient of the Medal of Honor for his actions in Vietnam in 1969, was the battalion commander. In accordance with the Unit Deployment Program, the battalion went on 2, 6-month deployments to Okinawa. From Camp Schwab they deployed to Mount Fuji, Japan, Korea, Guam, Tinian and Diego Garcia. Paul shipped

over in 1985 and was ordered to the 4th Marine Regiment at Camp Schwab, Okinawa, Japan. He formed a Scout Sniper Platoon and remained there for over four years. In 1990, Paul was ordered to the 3rd Bn., 2nd Marines and deployed in support of Operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm in August 1990 to the Persian Gulf with 4th Marine Expeditionary Brigade (MEB). The MEB returned to Camp Lejeune in April 1991.

In 1992, Paul put in for Marine Security Guard (MSG) training and graduated from the MSG School at Quantico, VA. He then was assigned as the Assistant Detachment Commander at the US Embassy in Prague, Czech and Slovak Federal Republic, at a time when former movie star Shirley Temple was the US Ambassador. He remained there during the partition of the country into the Czech Republic and Slovakia on Jan. 1, 1993. After promotion to staff sergeant and MSG Security Detachment Commander training, he commanded the security detachment at the US Embassy in Bangui, Central African Republic for about 18 months. In late 1994, he was ordered to the 1st Bn., 9th Marines at Camp Pendleton, CA where he served as an 81mm mortar section leader for the first 18 months. The second 18 months he was assigned to a Small Boat Company. During that assignment, he also graduated from the Small Boat Raid Course at the Naval Amphibious Base, Coronado, CA and the Summer Mountain Leaders Course at the Mountain Warfare Training Center in Bridgeport, CA. He then was ordered to the Marine Corps Security Forces Rota, Spain, as the Assistant Guard Chief/Training NCO. Over the next 3 years he was able to get 55 Security Force Marines accepted for advanced training with military forces all over Europe, all of it paid for by US Army. After promotion to gunnery sergeant in 2001, he was ordered to the Marine Corps Institute (MCI), a part of Marine Barracks, Washington, DC. Paul was one of 30 SNCOs involved in writing/reviewing training courses at MCI and his work incorporating civilian gaming technology into Marine training programs came to the attention of MajGen. Thomas S. Jones, who became a strong supporter of Paul's work because he wanted to bring new technology into the Corps' training programs. As a result, when Paul went on terminal leave on 22 November 2003, he was asked to become a direct report contractor providing training support for the Marine Corps. Since then, he has authored or assisted in writing numerous training course for the Marine Corps. He is currently working as a direct support contractor for Marine Corps System Command, Program Manager Training Systems as the Training Liaison Officer for Quantico.

Paul first met his wife Lenka in the early 1990s at the US Embassy in Prague, where Lenka worked as a Czech contract employee in the American Services Section. They have three children, Tereza, Tomas, and Anna.

VETERANS SERVICE OFFICER (VSO) OPPORTUNITY

The Marine Corps League National Headquarters has secured a dedicated office space within the new VA Clinic in Fredericksburg, to be staffed one day per week. This location will serve as a key service hub for transitioning service members from Marine Corps Base Quantico, as well as for veterans receiving care at Fredericksburg VA Clinic. This is more than just office space — it is a front-line post in the ongoing mission to serve those who have worn the uniform.

To fully use this space and fulfill our mission, **National Headquarters is seeking a local MCL member to serve as an accredited National Veterans Service Officer (VSO)**. This is a unique opportunity to directly support Marines and veterans in our community while representing the Marine Corps League as part of the national-level initiative.

To be eligible for accreditation, the members must:

1. Be a member of the MCL for at least 12 months.
2. Receive endorsements from both the Detachment Commandant and Department Commandant.
3. Successfully pass a VA background investigation.
4. Not currently employed by the Federal Government.
